DISCOVER MY BURGUNDY Discover diverse landscapes & interesting tastes



Hi, I'm Nadia, I'm a French girl living in Burgundy, visiting our partners at Outdoor Travel in Bright and I want to introduce you to my region, Burgundy.

I will always remember the day I cycled with my mum in the late September month along the Canal du Nivernais (she convinced me after she promised that we would eat a crepe at the crêperie afterwards). As we cycled, I suddenly felt a stream of happiness going through my whole body. As autumn arrived, the trees were covered with gorgeous red-gold leaves, the river reflected the scene in an enchanting way and it seemed like it was just my mum and I in the most mesmerising heaven. I felt so calm, happy and safe at the same time.

As you might know, Burgundy perfectly symbolises the old France. Indeed, with its ancient villages and still farming locals, with its century old churches and traditions, it stands for great kitchen, green hills and vast vineyards. You can discover my region whether by foot, bike or boat as it has a great network of canalised rivers such as the Yonne. Want to taste some local produce? Walk or cycle around little markets and taste some French cheese, pastry or snails if you dare...

What I like the most about my hometown, Auxerre, is the old centre, its little backstreets and the great riverside with its boats and fountains. Ready for lunch, try one of the typical French crêperies or go to the boat restaurant called 'La Peniche' on the riverside and try some of the famous French plates.

Burgundy has a rich and complex history and many areas of natural beauty. It is a beautiful and fertile land where farmers, foresters, and above all wine growers have nurtured the landscape for more than a thousand years. Burgundy is the ideal place for a walking or cycling holiday or to take a cruise along the picturesque canals. The region is split between the Yonne River area to the north with its white wines and easy access by train from Paris. Or the red wine capital of Beaune with its historic buildings and fine dining.

Burgundy has a multifaceted landscape just waiting to be explored, and, as elsewhere in France, the best way to enjoy it is to explore by foot through its peaceful lanes and byways. Travelers will discover a fabled land of medieval chateaux, ancient monasteries and fragrant breezes where the art of living, l'art de vivre, is pursued to near perfection at a relaxed pace.

Beaune has a cluster of prestigious vineyards such as the Côte d'Or, Côte de Beaune and Côte de Nuits. Start with a visit to the mansion of the Dukes of Burgundy, the basilica of Notre Dame and the steep pitched patterned roofs of the Hotel Dieu, and sample wine in the village of Pommard. Join the 'Grande Randonnée' paths through oak forests to the village and chateau of La Rochepot.

Visit Nolay, a medieval village of narrow streets and half-timbered houses. Ascend onto the escarpment and hilltops for glorious views to the Alps. Enjoy Rully, the ancient Château of Montaigu, the produce of the Côtes Chalonnaises and many villages. The landscape is a mix of vineyards on the lower slopes, woodlands, and pastures and arable land on the plateau.

Visit the charming town of Auxerre in the Yonne region of Northern Burgundy which has kept its historical identity with its impressive Cathedral St Etienne, its churches and its beautiful riverside. Have lunch in a typical French cr perie or a tasty boeuf bourguignon in one of the several restaurants and end with a delicious mousse au chocolat for dessert. Nearby is the town of Chablis to taste the wine and learn more about the vineyards and their history.

Vézelay is a starting point for pilgrims on the way to Santiago de Compostella. Visit the religious shrine with its impressive views over the Roman Basilica of Ste-Madeleine. Taste the delicious 'Anis de Flavigny' which are little pastilles produced in a centuries old abbey in the beautiful French village of Flavigny-sur-Ozerain. The process follows a 9th Century recipe that remains unchanged to this day.

Burgundy is all about going back in time, being transported to places you never been before and just encountering the 'Vieille France' - the old France – and its mysteries. It is about discovering places by foot or by bike with some flexibility to stop wherever you want, enter into this church or into that cellar and don't have to worry about parking a car. If you need to take a break, just sit down in the grass between the vineyards, have a picnic for lunch or just rest at a café in a village and taste some French cakes.

Burgundy is the place to discover local products as you walk or ride from village to village each with a lively market, shopping streets or or square, where you can have some free tastings of local produces.

Burgundy has a wonderful network of canals popular with cruising enthusiasts or those willing to give it a try. Cruise through many little villages, make a stop here and there to take a closer look to those interesting places. Why not try a Bike & Barge cycling cruise?

Starting in the capital of Burgundy, Dijon, you follow the Canal of Burgundy and the River Saône. The scenery changes from small villages and rolling hills to lively and attractive historical towns like Beaune and Chalon sur Saône. Surround yourself with ever changing landscapes of fields, dense forests and green hills covered in vines. Close your eyes and listen to the relaxing sound of water while cruising towards your next destination.

So, I hope I could arouse your curiosity and that you will soon visit my region! A bientôt, Nadia!



The beautiful limestone landscapes of the Marina Alta provide lots of great walks with views over the glistening Mediterranean Sea. Walk through villages lined with citrus and almond groves, explore spectacular ridges including the historic Caballo Verde, and visit nearby dramatic gorge, the Barranco del Infierno. With only limited number of people allowed to visit the gorge each day to help with preservation and conservation, you'll be rewarded with native flora and fauna and magnificent views.

TAKE A CANAL NARROWBOAT THROUGH BRITAIN

"Cruising Britain's inland waterways is all about slowing the pace right down," says Martyn Paterson, Managing Director of inland cruising specialists Outdoor Travel based in Bright, Victoria. As Rat is heard to utter in 'Wind in the willow, it's about "messing about on boats". Martyn has cruised the canals of Europe and the UK over many years, and rates the Brecon Canal meandering for 36 miles through the Brecon Beacons National Park in South Wales as one of the highlights.

Constructed historically to carry goods along the narrow canals during the industrial revolution, nowadays narrowboats are long houseboats fully fitted out, with well-equipped kitchens that let you self-cater (in between pub lunches and dinners). There are bathrooms with showers, separate dining areas. All linen and towels are provided as are lifejackets, which are important if you're taking kids, who must wear them whenever they're above deck. No licence or previous experience is necessary and tuition is provided.

SLOW THE PACE: If your mind is working on deadlines, canal boating isn't going to work. Locks can take time to pass and there is much to see that is unexpected along the towpath and around every bend. This is a holiday that slows the pace right down. So slow, you can jump off for a stroll, and let the boat catch up to

you. Narrowboats are hired usually for a week and there are circuits or 'rings' to follow back to the same base. Midweek and long weekend hire is also offered.

WHAT IS THE COST: Boat hire starts from £700 for a couple on a week's cruise in the spring and autumn shoulder seasons, rising up to £1400 in peak season. This covers your accommodation; transport and entertainment, so it's pretty good value. If you're pushed budget wise, £1399 will get a boat that sleeps up to 12 for family or friends, by pulling down the dining table and using all the foldaways. Outdoor Travel offers regular discounts of up to 35% off the hire cost so check with them for a quote for your canal holiday

WHERE TO GO: The Pontcysyllte Aqueduct on the Llangollen Canal is the Eiffel Tower of Wales, which you can cruise across, and is a must-visit for boaters. Other popular destinations include the Roman city of Bath on the Kennet and Avon Canal and the Stratford-upon-Avon Canal where you book yourself in for a Shakespeare play or visit Warwick Castle. From Gailey take the Four Counties Ring to see The Potteries and the famous Wedgewood factory or cruise to industrial Birmingham which, it seems has more canals than in Venice.

Unlike many ocean cruisers, stowage isn't an issue on these canal boats, which are narrow, but very long. And hire companies know that Australians will arrive with hard-shell luggage filled with hiking boots, dinner suits or cycling gear, for a month-long trip. Be sure to pack your raincoat, this is Britain after all, but there one onboard for the boat driver, who is in the elements the entire time, as narrowboats have no wheelhouse.

IDEAL FOR FAMILIES & FRIENDS: Narrowboats are ideal for families with children. Wildlife abounds along the canals and hedgerows and there is much living history to discover with restored Victorian era buildings and machinery. And many of the canalside homes and factories have been turned into museums, pubs, cafes and restaurants so there is plenty to do near your overnight moorings.

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EXCERPTS FROM A PILGRIM'S DIARY WALKING IN SPAIN Day 17 Camino de Santiago from Hornillos del Camino to Castrojeriz.

"I set off at 8.00am with the forecast of more rain. Today's walk continued on the Meseta through corn crops, no farmers or machinery was seen today because of the weather forecast.

The walk was on natural clay and stony paths, with some tarmac walking towards the end of the day. There was no shelter or shade, and very few walkers, they always seem to disappear for the Meseta, which I suppose can be very lonely but very peaceful.

It was a steady climb all the way to Hontanas, with a couple of descents. It was a nice comfortable walk until the rain came, twice. I met a man from Germany, neither if us spoke a language we understood, I have seen him for the last three days. I continued on until I reached the cross roads to San Bol and it started to rain here, I was putting on full rain gear when a Dublin couple appeared from San Bol, they went looking for coffee, there was none. Our paths have crossed for the last three days, a nice couple. They walked on and it started to rain heavy again, so no more photos for a while. But I found myself 2 inches taller because of the mud clinging to the sole of my boots.

After a few 7 miles I arrived at the village of Hontanas, the only location for refreshments today. By now it had stopped raining, but everything was pretty wet. Individuals were sat in the restaurant changing their wet socks.

I met John from Armagh in Ireland who is living and working in this village. He is working with Emma also from Armagh, who I met last year at her premises in Hornillos, she and her Spanish partner now have a premises in this village. I went into the beautiful church of the Conception where I lit a candle and said a prayer.

I moved on, it was threatening rain all the time now. I met a Spanish couple of my generation walking in the opposite direction, a nice friendly couple who started in Finisterre and were returning home to Barcelona, a distance of about 760 miles. When you meet people like this you have to keep going.

Further along I met a man sitting is his car who was offering home-made souvenirs, bottles of water and stamp your Camino Passport for a donation. I obliged and he posed for a photo.

I next walked through the ruins of a 14th century convent which straddled the road, see the photos. I was now getting nearer to Castrojeriz, in the distance I could see very dark clouds and falling rain, so it was a race to get there, which I badly lost. It was a torrent, worse than yesterday. I reached the outskirts of Castrojeriz, the water was flowing deeply in the streets, and very bad where it was coming down hill at you.

I managed to follow directions, but was having to put my walking poles in the water in front of me where there was a torrential gush, to make sure it was safe. At one point a man invited me into his house, I stood inside his hallway to confirm directions to my hotel. I eventually arrived, feeling and looking like a drowned rat.

After I booked in I let my family know I had arrived. I hung my wet clothes up around the room. The boots were the problem. My daughters gave me the solution, the hair dryer. It worked and dried the inside of my boots.

After a shower and some sorting out and the rain had stopped for the day, I went out and had a look around in very moderate temperatures.

I walked back, 20 minutes, to Our Lady of the Apple Tree church for 7.00pm mass. I was surprised I had to pay 1 euro to get in because I was 10 minutes early. After mass I had a very nice meal in a restaurant near to the church. Back at the hotel my intention is to leave early as the weather forecast is good.

I have an Irish couple from Kerry as neighbours in a nearby room as she has been singing for the last 15 minutes, traditional Irish emigration type songs."
