FRANCE - CRUISING THE SEINE FROM PARIS TO THE LOIRE VALLEY

8-days / 7-nights Quality Bike & barge canal & river cruises



Departs: 13th August 2011

From: Paris to Montargis in the Loire River Valley

Cost: AU\$1780 per person twin share, (single cabin supplement AU\$890)

Highlights: Vaux-le-Vicomte, the Chateau of Fontainebleau, mediaeval cities of Ferrières, the artist village at Barbizon, the gardens & forests of Ile-De-France & the rocks formations at Nemours

Included: Breakfast, packed lunch, dinner, bed linen and towels, bike rental and tour guide. The price does not include: entrance fees of museums etc; transfer to and from the barge, drinks on board, travel insurance and personal expenses

Bike & Barge cruises combines two popular ways of exploring Europe (cycling & river cruising), it allows partners of different abilities & interests to holiday together (trips are just as interesting for non-cycling partners, leisure cyclist OR enthusiasts), you unpack once & come 'home' each night to a wonderful meal and a comfortable cabin with your own bathroom. Well-maintained multi-gear bikes are provided (you can bring their own if you prefer). The cycling is fascinating and varied with free time at each day's destination.

Enjoy the splendour of rural France within easy reach or and with a night in central Paris

This region of Ile-de-France, once famed for its royal hunting grounds, grand country homes and palaces is an ideal location for an easy and relaxed cycling holiday. There is much to see and the terrain is cycle friendly with an average of 40 – 45km of riding each day. The tour starts in Montargis and from there we follow the Seine valley downstream towards Paris. The first couple of days we follow the canals Du Centre, a section of the waterway with a rich shipping history. We cruise through Montargis, with its many charming canals to Moret-sur-Loing a mediaeval fortified town, strategically situated on the banks of the Loing. Here the impressionist painter Sisley found inspiration for many of his works.

We continue along the Seine valley to an area rich in royal history and visit the castles of Vaux-le-Vicomte and Fontainebleau. At Vaux-le-Vicomte the impressive royal gardens are hugely popular, offering a traditional French style and perfect symmetry.

We cruise the woods of Fontainebleau, heading for the artists village of Barbizon. Our final destination is central Paris, where the Fleur will be moored overnight in the Port d' Arsenal, not far from the Notre Dame and all the major attractions of the city, transport links, fine restaurants, cafes, shopping, museums and galleries.

Suggested itinerary – may be offered in reverse:

Day 1 (Sat): Montargis

Arrival day – remember on some dates the boat runs in the reverse direction.

Arrive in Montargis (population 15.000 inhabitants - the biggest town of the Loiret after Orléans). The former royal residence here was destroyed by fire in the 16th century but the canals are still there and they give the town a unique charm. In Montargis there is a museum, named after the famous French painter Louis Girodet, where many of his paintings are on display. Plan to arrive at 4.00pm for a welcome drink and to meet fellow passengers and crew. Get fitted with your bicycle and relax before dinner at 6.30pm. After dinner, take a city walk of Montargis.

Day 2 (Sun): Montargis

Cycling distance: 45km

From Montargis we bike along the l'Ouanne by bike to Château - Renard, where we can visit the ruins of a castle from the 10th century. We will also visit Apiculture's Living Museum. There you can see beekeepers and their bees at work, and sample their delicious honey.

Day 3 (Mon): Montargis – Neronville

Cycling distance: 40km (sailing time 5-hours)

Today our route passes through the magnificent forests of Montargis, northeast of the town. Our next stop is the mediaeval town of Ferrieres with its old and preserved town centre (down one of its narrow streets you will find a splendid monastery). We travel west to the archeological site of Sceaux-du Gatinais and on to the old Gallic stronghold of Château-Landon, a fortified town situated on a large rock outcrop.

The Abbey of Saint-Severin here dates from the 13th century. We stop overnight in Neronville.

Day 4 (Tue): Neronville – Nemours

Cycling distance: Optional routes today or a free day to enjoy a leisurely cruise (sailing time 5-hours)

We are travelling today through a rural area that has been cultivated since before the Roman era and we plan to visit an orchard and berry farm where they produce lovely jams. We will discover the rocks of Nemours on our way and we meet the Fleur again in Nemours. In Nemours there is a castle or the prehistoric museum of the Ile-de-France region to explore.

Day 5 (Wed): Nemours - Moret-sur-Loing

Cycling distance: 40km (sailing time: 5-hours)

After breakfast today we cycle through woodland with rugged rock formations often on unsealed forest tracks. We follow the picturesque valleys of the Orvanne and Lunain with old farmhouses and castle ruins on the southern boundary of the forests of Fontainebleau. We are heading in the direction of Moret-sur-Loing, a charming mediaeval fortified town, strategically situated on the banks of the Loing, where the painter Sisley found inspiration for his beautiful impressionist paintings. As time allows we can visit the house where he was born.



Day 6 (Thu): Moret-sur-Loing – Melun

Cycling distance: 45km (sailing time: 5-hours)

Cycling through the manicured forests of Fontainebleau is a wonderful and inspiring journey and we will visit the city of Fontainebleau itself with its spectacular chateau. The chateau was much in favored by the French kings because of the extensive hunting available in the surrounding forests.

In the castle itself among other things of interest, there is a museum dedicated to Napoleon. The town of Fontainebleau is also a pleasant place to explore, with time for some souvenir shopping.

We continue our ride to the artistic village of Barbizon, where, since the first half of the 19th century, many famous painters have found inspiration and formed the landscape artist's 'school of Barbizon'. We can visit the local museum/gallery here.

Our final destination before Paris is Melun, a town which is known as 'le domaine des reines blanches', because in former years it used to be the popular as a place of residence of the widows of the French kings.

Day 7 (Fri): Melun – Paris

Cycling distance: 35km (sailing time: 8-hours)

We cycle to the River Seine by bicycle, rejoining the Fleur for the leisurely cruise into Paris avoiding the heavy traffic. The overnight mooring place of the Fleur is the Port d'Arsenal, not far from the Notre Dame and very central. After dinner there is an optional city walk visiting Montmartre and the Sacré-Coeur.

Day 8 (Sat): Paris

Tour ends after breakfast



Please note: We offer this tour as a Bike & Barge or as Barge only tour. You can decide each day if you want to join the bike ride or not. Daily distances can be adjusted according to ability.

The tour requires a minimum number of passengers to operate. In case there are less than 10 passengers on any departure, we may have to cancel the trip and we will refund you payments in full.
